

Back in Week 3, Willomavin's soccer team made the journey to Assumption College to compete against other local primary schools in the 2024 Winter Interschool Sports Competition.

Students had been learning a variety of soccer skills during P.E., and a group of passionate soccer enthusiasts had been competing fiercely during recess and lunch breaks for months. The Grade 5/6 students were grateful for the large number of Grade Four students who volunteered to ensure we could field full teams on the day. The team had two main foci for the competition: to enjoy the day and to encourage participation by upholding our school values.

Our first game was against Our Lady of the Way. Willowmavin got off to a flyer, scoring the 1st goal within the 1st minute! The team went on to win this game by 8 goals. The backline of Charlie, Ben, Bryce and Natalia did a marvellous job of repelling any OLW attacking moves and Zara and Riley (3 goals each) and Ruby (2 goals) finished off the hard running midfield work of Ruby, Hudson and Riley.

Willowmavin's second game for the day was against the highly credentialled Wandong Primary School. It was a tight affair until the deadlock was broken by a well taken strike by Ruby in the closing moments.

The win was truly a team effort. Charlie McK and Ryder provided great drive from midfield to support both attack and defence. Alex M., Charlotte, Hannah and Rayyan threw themselves in to frantically thwart any attack and our goalkeeper extraordinaire, Ben, made some crucial goal saving efforts to ensure that the team kept a clean sheet.

The team entered our third game knowing that another victory would likely see us through to the finals. Another close game ensued with Willowmavin going down to a solitary goal, scored in the last minute of the game. Had it not been for the heroics of Jumping Jai, our goalie for the game, then the game would have been over much earlier. Jai was determinedly supported by Iliana, Natalia, Charlie McC. and Hannah in defence. Tireless running by Riley, Zara, Ryder and Hudson also produced a number of scoring opportunities for the team.





Driving safely in the Wet

Driving on wet roads is different to driving on dry roads. The conditions vary from slippery roads, heavy downpours to light or heavy spray from passing trucks on the freeway.

Taking some precautions could save your life. Driving in heavy rain tips:

- · Slow down: tyres will have better traction & contact with the road & increase your distance from other cars significantly;
- · Always drive with two hands to stay in control;
- . Use your headlights to make yourself more visible and your air-conditioning to prevent the windscreen from misting up;
- · Drive in another vehicle's tracks. This makes it easier for the tyres to handle the water and see what's up ahead;
- · Stay vigilant of other drivers and dangers in your surroundings. Anticipate dangerous situations rather than waiting to react to them;
- If someone around you is driving dangerously (cutting in & out of traffic or driving close to your tail), let them pass. It's better to have them in front of you than behind;
- . When turning, brake in a straight line before you get to the turn. Maintain a constant speed through the turn. Do not brake during the turn as this can make you slip; and
- DON'T USE YOUR CRUISE CONTROL this will keep accelerating if you start aquaplaning;
- · If you hit water and start to aquaplane, take your foot off the accelerator, DO NOT BRAKE; and
- PULL OVER IF IT'S REALLY BAD and wait for the rain to slow down.

Driving on wet roads can be just as treacherous as is the risk of accidents. Our tips could help you stay alive:

- · Be conscious of spray from other vehicles, especially large trucks. This could temporarily reduce your visibility;
- DON'T DRIVE THROUGH FLOOD WATER;
- · Sometimes you underestimate the depth of the water, and your engine could stall. DON'T try to restart your engine until it has dried out and been checked;
- · Drive in the middle lane if possible. Water tends to pool near the edge of the road;
- Be considerate of your own spray and avoid driving fast through puddles near pedestrians or cyclists; and
- . DON'T set off with adequate fuel or a charged mobile. If delayed, these things might be very useful.

Vital Car Maintenance

Properly maintaining your car helps ensure your safety, the safety of your passengers and your fellow drivers.

Here are some ways to help keep your car running smoothly:

- Inspect your tyres regularly, ensuring you have the proper amount of tread, a minimum depth of 3mm, and tyre pressure as per the manufacturer's specifications;
- · Check your oil, water, and coolant each month;
- Test your lights for loose connections or burnt out bulbs;
- · Inspect your wiper blades for wear & tear.

Basic maintenance may prevent your car from breaking down on the road and also may prevent an accident.

Firewood Collection

Firewood collection areas open in state forests. Victorians are able to collect free firewood for personal use from state forest collection areas until 30 June.

People can collect up to two cubic metres per person per day during the firewood collection season with a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year.

Firewood collectors are being urged to play it safe and check local weather conditions as well as their planned route before heading into the forest, especially after recent flooding, storms and bushfires.

Firewood collected needs at least 8-12 months to cure & dry out. It's an offence to collect wood outside the designated areas.

Did you know?

Recreational motorcycles, including dirt bikes, are not permitted on roads unless:

- They are roads not declared as freeways or arterial roads and are outside built up areas (100km/h or less); or
- · Areas that are not a road and are solely for the training and assessment of a holder of a motor cycle learner permit by an organisation approved by VicRoads for that purpose.

A person riding a recreational motorbike on public roads or paths must be 18 years of age and hold an appropriate motorcycle learner permit or licence.

As for wearing a helmet when riding your recreational motorbike, it is illegal to ride a recreational bike without wearing an approved helmet. We also recommend other protective gear such as gloves, boots, goggles and body armour.

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


