I regularly talk with parents on school tours about how the school relies on its parents and families to contribute to the school, enabling the school to direct school funding as much as possible towards initiatives more impacting on student learning outcomes. If you would like to be more involved in the school, or feel you have a role to play in any way in improving our school, please reach out to the office.

#### **School Communication**

As with all primary schools, Willowmavin PS has a lot going on, a lot of the time. It is critical that families are aware of information being communicated from the school to ensure they are up to date with current happenings and events. Compass is of course our main platform for communication. Please ensure you have access to Compass on a device (mobile app is recommended) and are receiving notifications of school communication. Compass posts can be sent to individual year levels, so if you are getting a notification, the news is relevant to you or your child. E-mail is another form of communication utilised by the school, including e-mails that come direct from Compass. One of the most common forms of e-mail you will receive from the school is a Compass Chronicle notification. These notifications will be to inform you of specific information regarding your child. Celebration of Learning, Unfinished Work, Minor Behaviour and Positive Behaviour are the most frequent Chronicles sent out to families. Please keep an eye out for such e-mails and ensure you follow up with your child as requested. In the case of our Celebration of Learning and Positive Behaviour e-mails, which are by far the most common of these Chronicles recorded by staff, please also remind your child to come past the office to collect their BRRS tokens.

#### **Classroom Newsletters**

Speaking of school communication, a reminder that our classroom newsletters were sent out last week. Our classroom newsletters are designed to inform families of important information for the term ahead. They serve as a key tool in our efforts to work in partnership with families to best support our students' learning and development. Please make the time to look over these documents as they provide details on learning planned for this term. Through being aware of your child's learning at school, you will be better able to make the most of learning opportunities that present themselves outside of school. For instance, if your child's classroom newsletter has informed you that your child will be learning about money this term, you may find opportunities to build on this learning with your child during shopping trips.

A big thank you to all of our teachers for the time and effort put into these documents, ensuring families are not only informed, but also supported in engaging with their child's education and development. Classroom newsletters have also been attached to the newsletter Compass post.

#### Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Survey

Communication regarding the 2024 Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Survey (PCGS) was sent out via e-mail and Compass last week. Within this communication were links and instructions to engage in the 2024 survey. Paper copies are also available for families to collect from the office, should a paper version be preferable.

The higher the response rate for our school, the more effective the data will be in giving an accurate indication of parent perceptions of the school. The school utilises the data presented from these survey results to identify school improvement initiatives. This includes setting targets specifically related to statements in the survey, in our Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) each year. For instance, in our 2024 AIP, we have set PCGS targets of improving positive endorsement for Effective Teaching from 83% in 2023 to 88%, Stimulating Learning Environment from 81% in 2023, to 85%, and Student Voice and Agency from 81% in 2023 to 90%.

Thank you to the 8 families who have already completed the survey. This has our response rate at 21%. With just over 3 weeks remaining until the survey closes, there is a great opportunity for us to achieve a very high percentage response rate. So please take the time to complete the survey. Should you have any difficulties in accessing or completing the survey, please contact the office.

### What is Relay Theft?

July 2024

Cars are increasingly being stolen by criminals using technology to exploit the keyless entry systems found in many modern vehicles.

This method, often referred to as a 'relay attack', involves using electronic devices to amplify and relay the signal from a car's key fob to unlock and start the vehicle.

Typically, two thieves work together. Here is how the process generally works:

- One person stands near the car with a device that can capture the signal from the key fob. The other stands closer to the house with another device to relay the signal.
- The device near the house picks up the key fob signal and amplifies it, sending it to the accomplice's device near the car.
- The car receives the relayed signal and interprets it as if the key fob is nearby. This allows the thieves to unlock the car and start the engine, driving away without physically possessing the key.

This type of car theft has been reported in various regions in relatively low numbers within Australia. However, the risk is still present as the technology becomes more common in Australia.

#### How to Avoid Being a Victim of Relay Theft

There are several things you can do to protect yourself from relay theft:

 Use a Faraday Pouch – these pouches are lined with metallic material that blocks the signal;

- Turn off the Keyless feature check your owner's manual to see if this is an option to disable keyless entry;
- Fit a steering wheel lock this will make it more difficult to drive away with your vehicle even if they unlock it;
- Park securely in a locked garage, or a well-lit street;
- Key fob sleep mode some fobs have a sleep mode that prevents them from emitting a signal when not in use;
- Install an On-board Diagnostics (OBD) port locking device available with some models; and
- Ensure your car's software is up to date.

### How to Stop Theft from Vehicles

Most thieves break into cars because they see something they want inside. Thieves will break windows and damage locks in a matter of seconds to steal your valuables. Or, they may go from car-to-car until they find one that's unlocked.

By following a few simple tips you can protect your belongings:

- Remove all valuable items, such as mobile phones, laptops, tablets, wallet, sunglasses, coats, sports-gear, or even loose change. Even a GPS or dash cam can attract the criminal;
- Don't keep your home address on tags attached to your keys

   include your phone number instead;
- Avoid leaving your personal papers in your car. Your address could lead to breaking into your home while it's unattended or identity theft;
- ALWAYS take spare house keys and your door opener out of your vehicle when you leave;
- REMOVE any external tool boxes and equipment or secure them with heavy duty locks if they can't be removed;
- Secure your number plates with fitting anti-theft one way screws. These are available for a gold coin donation at your local library or Police Station;
- Close all windows, including the sunroof, and LOCK all doors and the boot before leaving your car unattended for any length of time;
- ALWAYS lock your car, even when parking at home, buying fuel or dashing into the shops;
- Double check the door handles before you leave your car. Make sure all the doors are locked. For modern cars with keyless entry systems, leave your fob away from your vehicle before you double check the door handles; and
- Consider installing a car alarm.

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### Driving in poor weather conditions

Extreme weather and poor light can make driving dangerous in the winter months. Make sure you adjust your driving by following these steps:

- It takes twice as much distance to stop in the rain, so slow down and maintain a safe distance to the vehicle in front;
- Wet and greasy roads can cause a vehicle to slip and slide;
- Never drive through large puddles or floodwater;
- Avoid unnecessary travel in heavy rain, hail or sleet. Find somewhere safe to pull over if your start to lose visibility of the edges of the road; and
- Driving in poor weather is more tiring as you have to concentrate more. Take regular breaks to avoid fatigue.

#### Did you know?

Black Ice generally forms at night time, in the early mornings or on sections of the roads that haven't been exposed to sunlight.

If you hit black ice, you will have little or no control over your vehicle. Until you clear the patch of ice, use your accelerator, brakes and steering as little as possible. If you try to struggle against the ice by braking hard or steering in the opposite direction, you increase the risk of spinning out.

Delay you trip if you can to avoid icy conditions. If you have to drive, allow plenty of time and drive carefully. Allow please of room between you and the car in front. Slow down and be patient.


