And just like that, here we go again! To our 45 students returning to Willow in 2025, welcome back. And to our 12 new students and 8 new families, we welcome you to your first school year at Willowmavin Primary School.

As is becoming tradition, we are having a very smooth transition into the school year. No doubt this is a result of our comprehensive transition processes as well as the engagement and support of parents and guardians to provide the guidance their children have needed to start their 2025 school year. Our F/1 class has definitely been a highlight, not just in the way they have commenced the year looking as though school is old hat to them, but also due to each of our F/1 students having a 100% attendance record so far – meaning not a single student from F/1 has had an absence!

We are very fortunate to have Rhonwyn completing her Education Support placement at Willow this term.

By all reports (and my own observations!), Nova and Rhonwyn have got off to a fantastic start, quickly developing rapport with students and staff alike. 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Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achi evement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early – a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that students go to school every day – even in the early years of primary school.

What we can do

The main reasons for absence are: Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term if it can be avoided.

"Day off" – Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

 Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up.



Primary school attendance

 Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of Education and Early Childhood Development Regional Director who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.

Motor Vehicle Theft is on the rise

Motor vehicle theft is on the rise, highlighting the need for Victorians to be vigilant about their home and car security.

Motor vehicle theft has reached a ten year high in Victoria, with 22,964 cars stolen in the year ending 30 June 2024 according to Crime Statistics Victoria: an increase of almost 37 per cent from the previous year. Of those cars, 5,624 were taken from the grounds of a private dwelling, while 6,948 cars were stolen from a street or footpath. Neighboourhood Watch has researched why this trend is going up.

Older models can be hot-wired but there are fewer of the pre-2000 cars on the road now-a-days. The majority of the cars are later model cars and they are stolen using their own keys. Thieves look for keys left in the car, or located conviently in the house and they use these keys to steal the car before you even realise they have entered the house.

What can you do to prevent this from happening? NHW has come up with some simple steps:

- Avoid leaving your keys on a side table, on your dining table, kitchen bench, etc or hook near the door;
- · Avoid leaving your keys or remote control to your garage in your vehicle;
- · Lock your door into your garage from your house. It sounds simple, and will help prevent easy access to your house if the garage is penetrated;
- · Even if you are home LOCK the doors! Theives are brazen and will enter even if you are home; and
- Remove all your valuables from your vehicles. Many incidents of theft are avoidable if people just remember to take phones, cash, tools, etc. out of the car!!

Summer Safety

Neighbourhood Watch is a community lead program which works together with our neighbours to help our community be better, safer, and friendlier.

Summer in our community we have some unique challenges: snakes, fires, heat and water safety.

Snakes do not set out to attack people or our pets but are often found on farms or are in our bushland. Recognising the species may save a life. The most venomous snakes found in Victoria are the tiger snake, brown snake, redbellied black snake and the copperhead snake.

Many of the varieties of snakes are breeding in the late summer. The live young are born in a membranous sac. There will also be a mini influx of new borns scattered across the shire. Although shy, they become defensive when discovered from there hiding place so keep clear and call a snake catcher to remove them safely.

Fires although we recommend fire preparation in October, well before the fire season, sometimes you need to review your fire preparation, particularly following windy days when branches might be broken, dried bark or leaves might be blown around or items are left out in your garden. There will be a few more hot days before the summer is finished and they may come with dangerous conditions. Now is the time to get up and check your guttering again, sweep the back porch or patio, and put away loose items which might catch alight if a fire starts nearby.

Heat can also play a role in increased health risks, including dehydration, heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and even strokes or heart attacks. It is a good idea on hot days to check in with your loved ones and neighbours to make sure they are staying cool and hydrated.

Water Safety at the beach or pool starts with basic advise:

- Supervise non swimmers and children at all times
- Don't assume that the beach or river was safe in the past and therefore is safe now. Take the time to observe the conditions to identify any dangers
- Swim at patrolled beaches or pools (where possible)
- Avoid alcohol if you are planning to swim
- Teach your children or weaker swimmers who to do if they get into trouble. Remain calm, float and raise an arm to signal for help from the life guard.
